Call for Resumes

Indian Bay Ecosystem Research Station

The 2010 summer season saw the third annual hosting of a terrestrial field course at the field research station in Indian Bay Big Pond. The field course was taught by Dr. Tom Chapman from Memorial University. Students participating in the course got the opportunity to design and implement a scientific investigation at the field station. Students were able to enjoy many real life animal encounters during their stay, including moose, beaver, owl, grouse, squirrel, and gray jay sightings. Participants shared their experiences on a Facebook page for the Field Course in Terrestrial Biology (Biol 4820).

We hope to see the continuation and growth of field courses like Biology 4820 in the future. We encourage all interested institutions or faculty members to contact us for more information on the research station.

The field station also has the capacity to host training sessions, research, symposiums, or corporate retreats for all interested organizations or individuals.

Climate Change Adaptation Study

During 2010-2011, the Towns of Indian Bay and CWT were one of 7 pilot communities that participated in a climate change adaptation study that was conducted by Memorial University, Dept. of Environment and Conservation, Municipalities NL, and Professional Municipalities Administrators (PMA). Key climate issues identified for the town of Indian Bay in this study were flooding of the river upstream of the bridge, changing winter weather conditions contributing to access problems to cabins and recreational activities in the watershed, and quality of drinking water in the watershed due to potential contamination as a result of increased recreational usage. A Pilot Planning Workbook was developed to assess the issues identified and to act as an adaptation guide for communities to plan for future climate change events. Emergency Planning processes were also discussed with municipalities as part of this project. IBEC is exploring how they can partner with the community and other participating members of this project to support climate adaptation efforts within the Indian Bay area.
